

Two Who Might Have Been Here, But Were Not

The first white man to reach our area that we know of was the Frenchman de Bourgmont in 1714. But was he really first?

Coronado never made it to Nebraska, and there was no Spanish outpost in Plattsmouth. However, there was, according to early twentieth century Nebraska State Historical Society Superintendent Adison Sheldon, "the strange story of Don Diego de Penalosa and his wonderful expedition across the plains to the kingdom of Quivira."

Penalosa's expedition was described by Judge James Savage in *History of the City of Omaha*, published in 1894. The expedition left Santa Fe on 6 March 1662, with 80 Spanish soldiers and 1,000 very well armed Indians, along with 36 supply carts, a large coach for his excellency, six cannons, 800 horses, and 300 mules. Savage traced the route of Penalosa from Santa Fe and found that the Count reached the Platte River near Louisville. Short of that point (but somewhere in Nebraska), Penalosa "encountered a war party of the Escauzaques nation, who dwelt along the fortieth parallel of latitude [today's Nebraska-Kansas state line]. [They presented] themselves as bound for one of the great cities of Quivira, with whose inhabitants they were at war. With these warriors, who numbered about three thousand, Penalosa marched westward for a day along the ... river [Platte] until it made a bend so that it came from the north." This point Judge Savage took to be the site of Ashland.

Penalosa continued to follow the river northward along its west bank until they saw, on a high ridge across the river, smoke signals. Undaunted, Penalosa's army proceeded on, now westward, for the river had changed its course. Soon they spotted on the north side of the river a large city with "thousands of houses, circular in shape for the most part, some two, three, and even four stories in height, framed of a hard wood and skillfully thatched." The city stretched on for miles. The city, again according to the Judge, lay between the Loup and Elkhorn Rivers not far from the present Columbus. Then Penalosa camped, giving orders that no one was to cross the river until daybreak.

But the Escauzaques crossed the river during the night and "falling upon the peaceful dwellers of the city, so ravaged, burned and murdered," that at sunrise, when Penalosa forded the river, not a living citizen was to be found within it. No gold, silver, or precious stones could be uncovered anywhere. With that discovery, the interest of the Don and his followers soon vanished. They left the ruins of the once-magnificent city in dust.

Judge Savage concludes, "There is certainly some ground, however slight, for supposing that it was Quivera, the magnificent city of the Spaniards' dreams."

But it was all a fable. Even the Judge had his doubts.

Then there was the Yazoo Indian Moncachet-Apé.

Antoine-Simon Le Page du Pratz lived in New Orleans and Natchez between 1718 and 1734. After he returned to France, Le Page wrote a book in which he described the adventures of Moncachet-Apé, an aged Yazoo Indian, who lived near Natchez. In his account, Le Page explains that his hero's name translated as "he who overcomes difficulty or weariness" – well named!

According to Le Page, Moncachet-Apé had an insatiable curiosity. Several years before 1700 (none of our sources is clear on exactly when), his wife and children tragically died. After losing his family, he resolved to search for the land of his ancestors. He wandered alone, but was welcomed by all tribes, for it seemed he had a natural linguistic ability. He went first to the St. Lawrence River Valley, then south along the Atlantic coast, and finally to the Pacific. As historian Bernard DeVoto notes, "That would make him the first person known to have crossed the continent in the area of the United States."

In his cross-continental journey, he went up the Missouri River, which of course is that part of his story that interests us. He crossed the Mississippi on a raft he built and landed just above the mouth of the Missouri. Historian Andrew Davis translated Le Page's record of Moncachet-Apé's tale from French into English and describes his impression of the meeting of the two great waters:


Their difference is great, for the Great River [Mississippi] which I had just crossed, is very clear above the Missouri, although below it is muddy even to the Great Water [ocean]. This comes from the Missouri, whose waters are always muddy in all its course, which is very long. I saw also that these two waters flowed for a long distance, side by side, that on the West being muddy, and on the East the water is clear.

Moncachet-Apé travelled up the north bank of the Missouri. Here interpretations of his wandering differ. Historian Andrew Davis believes he next went up the Platte River, DeVoto thinks the Indian continued up the Missouri. We arbitrarily side with Davis, since we are blatant Platte partisans. That requires some interpretation based on, as Davis states, "he spent the winter in the vicinity of the mouth of the Platte," which would have been with the Otoe Indians. "I passed the winter with them, during which so much snow fell that it covered the earth as deep as a man's waist." Moncachet-Apé remained with the tribe "to learn the language spoken a little further on" and to seek directions on reaching the Great Sea of the West.


When winter was over, Moncachet-Apé left his hosts, following the river, which flowed from northwest by west, not from the north. Davis speculates that meant that the Indian was following the Platte River and later the North Platte. Moncachet-Apé states that he eventually left the river and traveled due north across flat land until he encountered a stream flowing west – the Beautiful River he called it, which he floats down to the Pacific. By that point the tale has fallen apart both geographically and topographically. As DeVoto succinctly put it "for north of the Missouri east of the Continental Divide no river flows west, and Moncacht-Apé

crosses no height of land."

LePage fabricated the whole story to summarize the then current knowledge of North American geography, a knowledge that was certainly incomplete and would not begin to take accurate shape until after Lewis & Clark made their epic (and actual) journey.
